ENGLISH AS AN OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

ENGLISH IS THE PRIMARY OFFICIAL LANGUAGE OF NEW ZEALAND AND IS USED EXTENSIVELY IN GOVERNMENT, BUSINESS, EDUCATION, AND EVERYDAY COMMUNICATION. IT SERVES AS THE LINGUA FRANCA FOR THE MAJORITY OF THE POPULATION, FACILITATING INTERACTION BOTH DOMESTICALLY AND INTERNATIONALLY.

MĀORI LANGUAGE AS AN OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

THE MĀORI LANGUAGE, OR TE REO MĀORI, WAS DECLARED AN OFFICIAL LANGUAGE IN 1987. THIS RECOGNITION CAME AS PART OF EFFORTS TO PRESERVE AND REVITALIZE THE LANGUAGE OF THE INDIGENOUS MĀORI PEOPLE. MĀORI HOLDS CULTURAL SIGNIFICANCE AND IS TAUGHT IN SCHOOLS, USED IN MEDIA, AND INCORPORATED INTO PUBLIC SIGNAGE AND CEREMONIES.

NEW ZEALAND SIGN LANGUAGE (NZSL)

NEW ZEALAND SIGN LANGUAGE WAS GRANTED OFFICIAL LANGUAGE STATUS IN 2006. IT IS THE MAIN LANGUAGE OF THE DEAF COMMUNITY IN NEW ZEALAND AND IS USED IN EDUCATION, INTERPRETATION SERVICES, AND OFFICIAL COMMUNICATIONS TO ENSURE INCLUSIVITY.

ENGLISH: THE DOMINANT LANGUAGE

ENGLISH IS THE DOMINANT LANGUAGE SPOKEN THROUGHOUT NEW ZEALAND, REPRESENTING THE MOTHER TONGUE OF APPROXIMATELY 95% OF THE POPULATION. IT FUNCTIONS AS THE PRIMARY MEDIUM FOR COMMUNICATION IN NEARLY EVERY SECTOR OF SOCIETY.

VARIETIES OF ENGLISH IN NEW ZEALAND

NEW ZEALAND ENGLISH HAS DISTINCTIVE CHARACTERISTICS THAT DIFFERENTIATE IT FROM OTHER ENGLISH DIALECTS WORLDWIDE. IT FEATURES UNIQUE VOCABULARY, PRONUNCIATION, AND IDIOMATIC EXPRESSIONS INFLUENCED BY BOTH BRITISH ENGLISH AND THE INDIGENOUS MĀORI LANGUAGE.

ROLE OF ENGLISH IN EDUCATION AND MEDIA

MĀORI LANGUAGE AND ITS REVITALIZATION

TE REO MĀORI IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF NEW ZEALAND'S CULTURAL IDENTITY AND HERITAGE. DESPITE A DECLINE IN FLUENT SPEAKERS DURING THE 20TH CENTURY, REVITALIZATION EFFORTS HAVE SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASED THE USE AND VISIBILITY OF MĀORI LANGUAGE ACROSS THE COUNTRY.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT OF TE REO MĀORI

NEW ZEALAND SIGN LANGUAGE

NEW ZEALAND SIGN LANGUAGE (NZSL) SERVES AS THE PRIMARY MODE OF COMMUNICATION FOR THE DEAF COMMUNITY IN NEW ZEALAND. ITS RECOGNITION AS AN OFFICIAL LANGUAGE MARKS A SIGNIFICANT STEP TOWARD LINGUISTIC INCLUSION AND ACCESSIBILITY.

CHARACTERISTICS OF NZSL

OTHER LANGUAGES SPOKEN IN NEW ZEALAND

COMMON IMMIGRANT LANGUAGES
